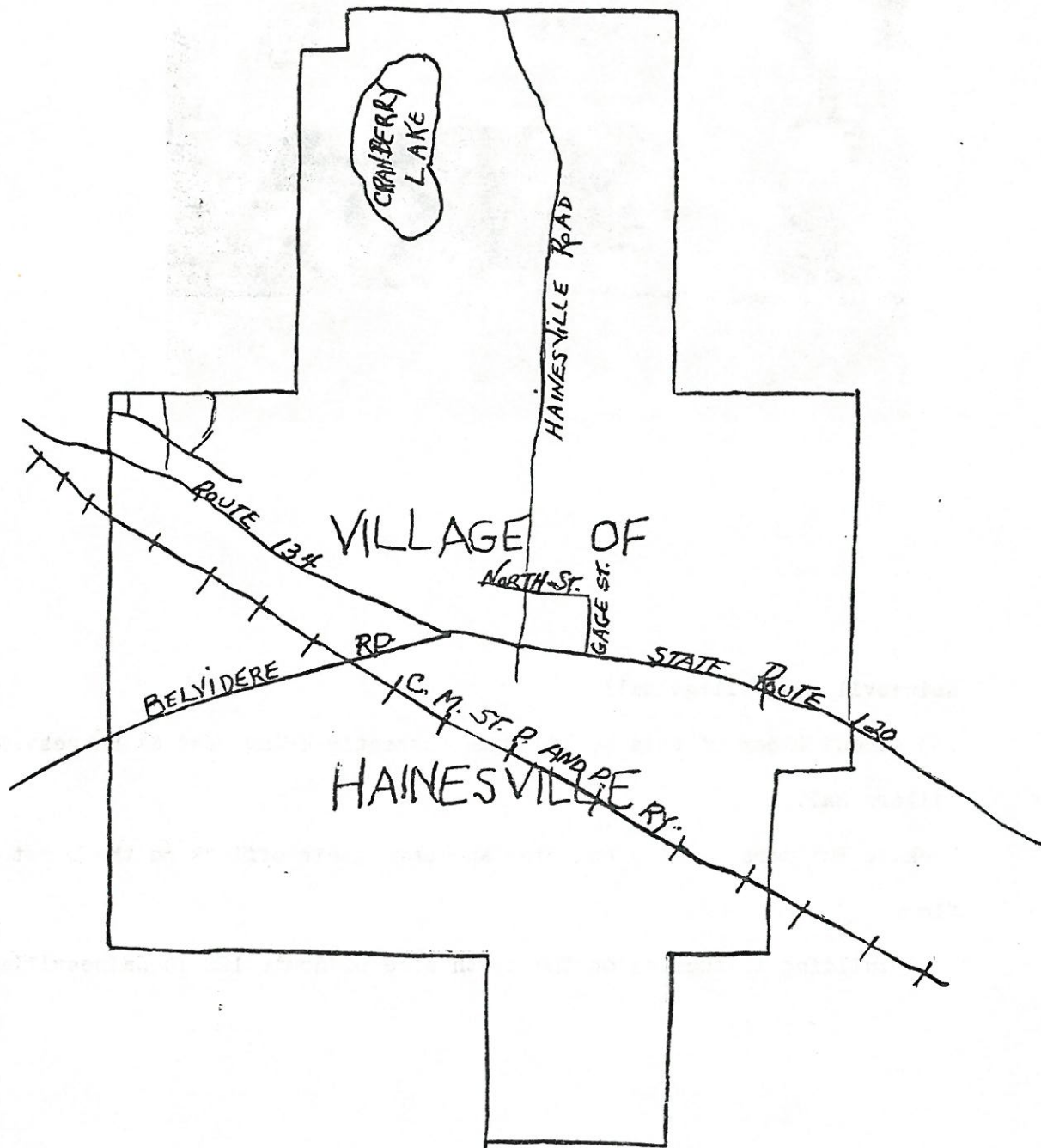

Seekatz Builders own the building and have their offices on the first floor.

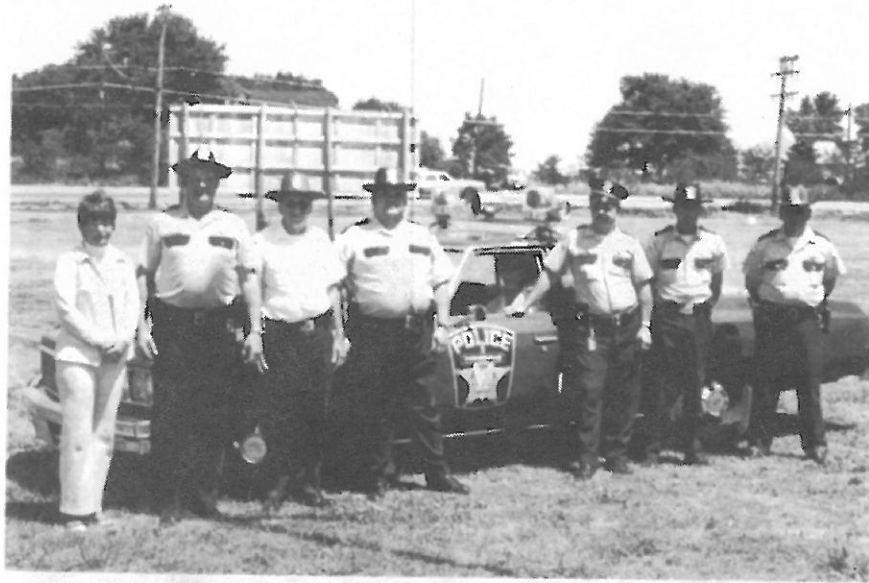
This building is located on the south side of Route 120 in Hainesville.

Hainesville's Village Government consists of the following people:

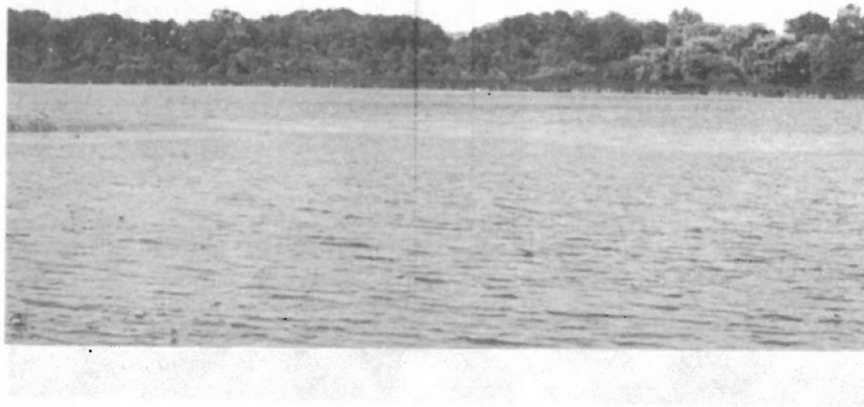

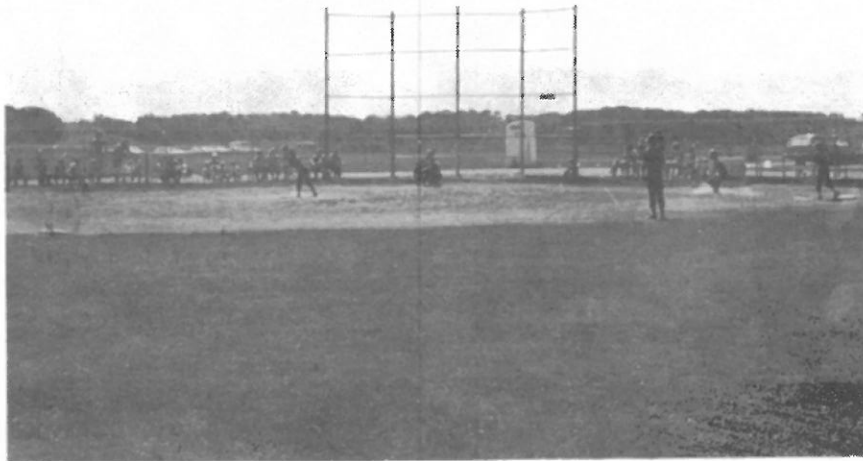
Cranberry Lake

This small lake which is situated in the Village of Hainesville, is a lovely lake surrounded by a marsh and large oak trees.

Its name is derived from the cranberries that once grew there and which yielded two hundred bushels annually.

It is located just west of Hainesville Road and north of Route 120.

It is presently owned by the Grayslake Gelatin Company.



Avon Township Youth Baseball Park

On the east side of Hainesville Road, on the property that once belonged to the Renehan Family, is Hainesville's Youth Baseball Park.

This parcel of land was donated for the use of a ball park by the Grayslake Gelatin Company.

They began in the spring of 1966 and today they have six fields and a large parking lot. There is also a refreshment stand available for the ball-players and spectators.



The Country Boutiques

The Country Boutiques Antique Shop began their business in Hainesville in 1964. The building has a long line of history behind it.

It was once George Battershall's store and it was also Hainesville's Post Office.

He has been the proprietor of his green-house for almost 30 years and is extremely knowledgeable in herb plants.

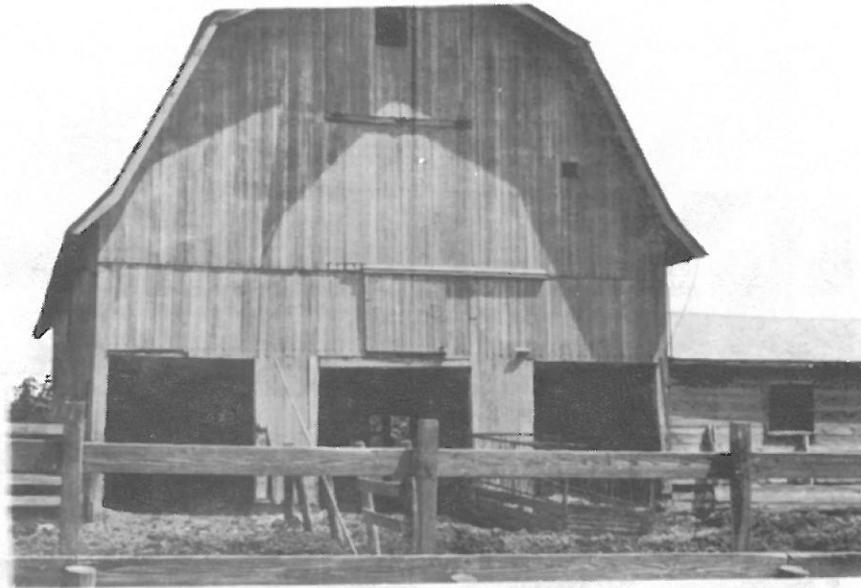
His green-house is located at the intersection of Route 120 and Hainesville Road.



These buildings are part of the Grayslake Gelatin Farm on the south side of Route 120 in Hainesville.

The Gelatin Company owns 1,706 acres that surrounds the Village of Grayslake on three sides.

The Grayslake farm was started in 1935 as an investment by Harry Epstein, John Epstein's father. In 1927 the Grayslake Gelatin Co. in Grayslake was founded.



This barn is also a part of the farm that is owned by the Grayslake Gelatin Company. It is located north on Route 134.

The farms raise hundreds of pigs annually, they have a very good dairy herd, and also grow corn, alfalfa, oats, and soybeans.

This immense farm spread boundaries are Curran Road near Round Lake on the west to Alleghany Road on the east. It also stretches south to the Avon-Fremont Township line and north to Drury Lane.

In between these boundaries is a stretch of land between Alleghany Road and Renehan Road.



J & L Service Station

This service station was erected by the J & L Oil Company in 1965. It is located at the intersections of Route 120 and Hainesville Road.

It is managed by Earl Creek.



Green's Auto Service

Mr. Charles Green began his auto service in Hainesville in 1970. His business is located just north of the J & L Service Station, at the intersections of Route 120 & Hainesville Road.



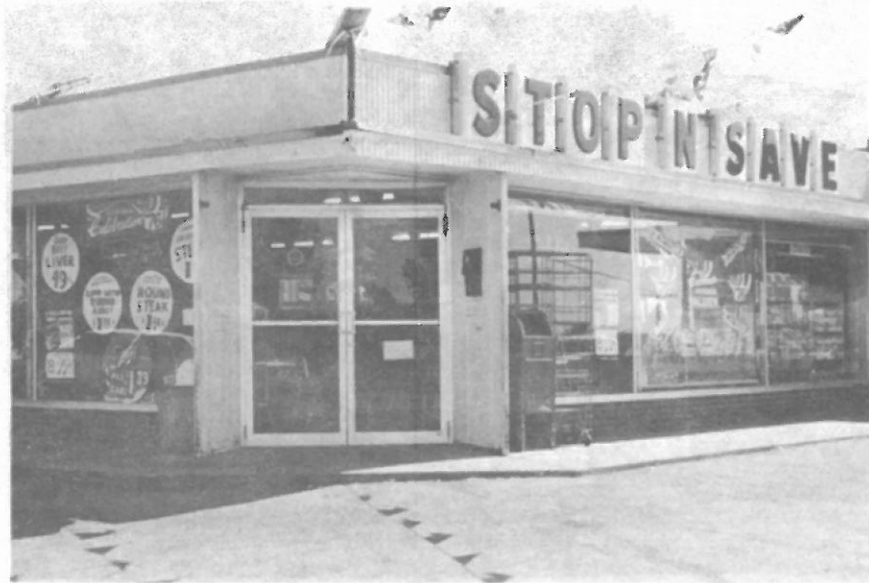
Paul's Union 76

Robert I. Legge.

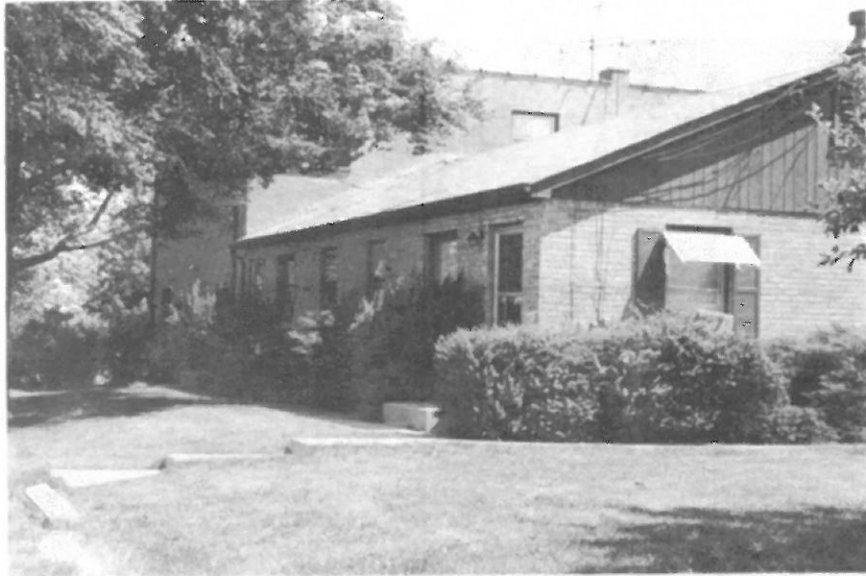
They purchased their home on Pineview Avenue in 1943 and for the

George Miller's Apartments

In 1959, George Miller purchased a parcel of land at the intersections of Route 120 and Gage Street in Hainesville and built a three unit apartment building. The property once belonged to the Fritsch and Heard families.



This large old residence was originally the McQuire residence.

It presently is owned by the Volle Family.

The property also has two homes which are located in back of
the large old home.

This property is located on the main street in Hainesville,
Route 120.



The early victorian residence is that of the Erland Johnson Family. It is over 120 years old and has been occupied by some prominent settlers of Hainesville. It is located in Block 1, in the village.



The Dan Schappert residence is a lovely victorian style home. It is a home that dates back over a hundred years ago and was also occupied by early pioneers of Hainesville. It is located in Block 3, in the Village of Hainesville.



The Belvidere House

In 1968, Mrs. Blanche Fontana began her antique shop in Hainesville. The Belvidere House was truly a fitting name, as it is situated on Belvidere Road in Hainesville.



This large old home is presently situated on the Grayslake Gelatin Farm property south on Route 120.

It originally was located on the Ezra Shanks farm at Squaw Creek.

It was moved here in the 1920's by a man named Jack Heirs. Lyle

Loftus was one of the men who help with the operation.



Hainesville's fourth school house was built in 1940, and is located on the south side of Route 120 in Hainesville.

It is currently unoccupied and belongs to the Round Lake School District.



Avon Apartments

In the middle of the 1950's, James Wehr built the Avon Motel.

In 1959, Peter Kerpan had purchased it and converted the property from a motel into a four unit apartment complex.

Clyde Pecor then purchased the property in 1967 and retained it until 1973, when he sold it to Henry Braun, who is the current owner.



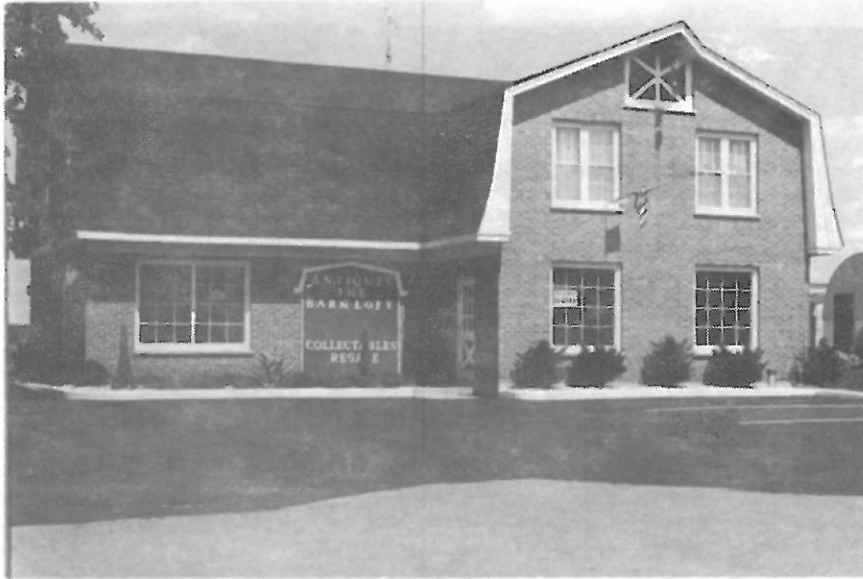
Tom's Auto
